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BACKGROUND AND	Discussions among FDP member organizations revealed that the volume and
SUPPORTING INFORMATION:	complexity of Data Transfer and Use Agreements (DTUAs) executed to share
	research data are increasing. When every data provider uses a different
	agreement, significant time must be spent reviewing widely varying
	agreement terms during the negotiation (much as was the case with MTAs
	when the UBMTA was developed).
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	The existence of a low-burden method for sharing data that cannot be made publicly available will be especially critical in helping organizations comply
	with sponsors' data sharing requirements. For example, the Proposed
	Provisions for a Draft NIH Data Management and Sharing Policy recently
	published by NIH (see NIH Guide Notice NOT-OD-19-014) specifically
	references data sharing agreements as a requirement that would need to be
	addressed in Data Management and Sharing Plans (see section IV.6). A
	streamlined agreement that facilitates broad sharing and re-use of research
	data while ensuring appropriate security and privacy considerations are
	addressed will facilitate compliance with these types of sponsor
	requirements.
	The DTUA template has been created as a first step towards creating greater
	consistency in terms and format to reduce associated administrative burden.
	The DTUA Working Group included at least one representative from
	approximately 30 member organizations and 2 individuals from Federal
	agencies. In the initial drafting stage, the working group reviewed 15 sample
	DTUAs provided by member organizations and leveraged language and
	formatting from other widely accepted templates, such as the Universal
	Biological Material Transfer Agreement (UBMTA) and the FDP Research
	Subaward Agreement.
	In the course of developing the template companents, each decument was
	In the course of developing the template components, each document was shared broadly with the FDP membership for feedback. Many organizations
	routed the documents for additional internal review to provide
	comprehensive feedback. Where possible, this feedback has been
	incorporated into the final, published template documents.
	By moving the DTUA into a formal pilot phase, we hope to accomplish two
	goals:
	1) To confirm whether the template has the desired outcome of
	reducing the administrative burden of data sharing and
	2) Collect feedback on what, if any, changes to the templates and/or
	methods of use may be needed to optimize the benefits.

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BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PILOT:	Pilot Participants will be expected to use the FDP DTUA template when they
	are the Provider of de-identified data or a Limited Data Set to another FDP
	member organization or other domestic low-risk non-profit. We recognize
	that the Recipient in a DTUA often has far less control in determining the
	format of the agreement to be used. However, when Pilot Participants are the Recipient of de-identified data or a Limited Data Set from another FDP
	member organization or other low-risk domestic non-profit, the Pilot
	Participant must agree to at least request that the Provider use the FDP
	DTUA template. In other data sharing scenarios, use of the DTUA template
	is not required, but Pilot Participants may choose to use the DTUA template
	if appropriate or may use a modified version of the DTUA template if the
	FDP moniker is removed.
	We are asking Participants to commit to use of the DTUA template beyond
	just other Participants to ensure that sufficient data is obtained. Unlike
	other pilots, such as the Expanded Clearinghouse, it is very difficult to
	anticipate whether Participants will need to enter into a DTUA with other
	Participants in a given year. Additionally, the qualitative information we will
	gather from Participants regarding their experiences using the template with
	non-Participants (see information on our metrics collection instruments) will be critical to the working group's efforts to update the templates to be
	useful to as broad of an audience as possible.

	Participants will provide quarterly quantitative data regarding the volume
	and turn-around time of all DTUAs and periodically complete a Qualtrics
	questionnaire to provide feedback on usability of the templates, including
	terms that regularly need to be modified, added, or deleted during
	negotiations. The Qualtrics questionnaire will also be made available to
	organizations who are not formal Pilot Participants to ensure that feedback
SIGNIFICANCE TO FDP:	is obtained from as broad of a potential user base as possible. This pilot seeks to test whether a standardized, streamlined DTUA template
SIGNIFICANCE TO FDP:	can be developed to meet the needs of the FDP membership and whether
	such a template helps to reduce the administrative burden associated with
	data sharing for research, while also ensuring good stewardship of the data
	and compliance with applicable laws and regulations. If successful, this pilot
	will demonstrate a more efficient DTUA model than in use today. If
	unsuccessful, valuable information will be learned that may help better
	target the road blocks to efficient data sharing. This information can in turn
	be shared with member organizations as well as agencies to help develop

PARTICIPANTS:	Approximately 30 FDP member organizations have previously expressed interest in participating. We plan to start with those 30 organizations as well
	as making a feedback questionnaire available more broadly. At the 6-month
	mark, we will evaluate whether additional organizations can/should be
	added. This determination would be based upon interest from additional
	member organizations as well as the volume of data obtained up to that
	point.
	Participants from FDP member organizations will be expected to:
	Use the FDP DTUA template and applicable attachments as outlined in the Bilat Participation Agreement signed by each participating.
	in the Pilot Participation Agreement signed by each participating
	organization.Provide the contact information requested by the DTUA Working
	Group and notify the DTUA Working Group of updates as necessary
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	 Agree to the public posting of their organization's name in a manner that identifies the organization as a participating member of the pilot. Complete the quantitative metrics spreadsheet on a quarterly basis, complete the Qualtrics questionnaire for at least 1-3 DTUAs per month (if any have been executed in that month), and respond to other surveys or requests for feedback as requested by the DTUA Working Group periodically over the course of the Pilot. Provide suggestions for improvement and participate in formal evaluations. Participants will have the option to terminate their participation at any time with thirty (30) days' written notice to the DTUA Working Group Co-Chairs.
	 The FDP DTUA Working Group will Develop and maintain all necessary user documentation, FAQs, surveys and reports Use the qualitative feedback received to develop, maintain and enhance the DTUA Template Coordinate communication among the participants and provide participants with regular updates and status reports on the pilot Provide regular updates to the broader FDP community via information shared on the Data Stewardship and Contracts listservs and at regularly scheduled FDP meetings.
PILOT TIMETABLE:	We anticipate the time period of the Pilot to be 12 months with evaluation at the 6-month mid-point that would lead to a decision to stop, refine, continue, or expand the pilot to a larger pilot or full demonstration that includes other FDP organizations. This decision would be based on the data obtained from Pilot Participants up to that point as well as interest expressed by other member organizations.
SUCCESS CRITERIA:	 Participants are able to use the DTUA template without modification to share de-identified data or a Limited Data Set in compliance with applicable laws and regulations. When the DTUA template is used, Participants are able to execute the agreement in a timelier manner.
PLANS FOR EVALUATION:	 Quantitative data to be collected quarterly via excel spreadsheet to determine volume and turn-around time for various DTUAs. Qualitative data will be collected to gauge usefulness and usability of the templates and collect feedback on what, if any, changes are needed to enhance the usefulness. An additional survey may be administered up to twice during the period of the Pilot. A report will be prepared at the end of the pilot recommending next steps.
EARLY TERMINATION PLAN:	Continuous evaluation will take place throughout the pilot phase. At any point during the pilot if things are not going well or the process is causing undue complications for the pilot organizations the working group will review for possible termination. A summary report of activity and supporting justification will be provided to the Executive Committee for concurrence prior to official termination.
