OMB Memorandum M-20-11

On March 9, 2020, The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) issued Memorandum M-20-11: <u>Administrative Relief for Recipients and Applicants of Federal Financial Assistance Directly Impacted by the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19)</u> which identified the following agency actions to relieve short term administrative, financial management and audit requirements under 2 CFR Part 200 without compromising Federal financial assistance accountability requirements.

OMB is allowing federal agencies to grant class exceptions in instances where the agency has determined that the purpose of the federal awards is to support the continued research and services necessary to carry out the emergency response related to COVID-19. Further, agencies are reminded of their existing flexibility to issue exceptions on a case-by-case basis.



OMB Memorandum M-20-17

On March 19, 2020, OMB issued Memorandum M-20-17: Administrative Relief for Recipients and Applicants of Federal Financial Assistance Directly Impacted by the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) due to Loss of Operations. This Memorandum expands the scope of OMB Memorandum M-20-11 that provided flexibility to grant recipients performing essential research and services necessary to carry out the emergency response related to COVID-19.

Memorandum M-20-17 provides similar administrative relief listed in M-20-11 to an expanded scope of recipients affected by the loss of operational capacity and increased costs due to the COVID-19 crisis. Many of the operational impacts and costs are unknowable at this point, as they will depend on the spread of the coronavirus and response dictated by public health needs.



OMB Memorandum M-20-20

On April 9, 2020, OMB issued Memorandum M-20-20: Repurposing Existing Federal Financial Assistance Programs and Awards to Support the Emergency Response to the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19). This is the third Memorandum OMB has issued in response to this national emergency.

OMB issued a class exception that allows federal awarding agencies to repurpose their federal assistance awards (in whole or part) to support the COVID-19 response, as consistent with applicable laws in accordance with the authority in 2 CFR § 200.102(a), Exceptions.

Example: Agencies may allow recipients to donate medical equipment (including, but not limited to, personal protective equipment, medical devices, medicines, and other medical supplies) purchased with federal assistance funds to hospitals, medical centers, and other local entities serving the public for COVID-19 response.



OMB Memorandum M-20-26

On June 18, 2020, OMB issued Memorandum M-20-26: Extension of Administrative Relief for Recipients and Applicants of Federal Financial Assistance Directly Impacted by the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) due to Loss of Operations.

This memorandum provides an extension of two items from Memorandum M-20-17. (See M-20-26, Appendix A.)

- <u>Item 1 M-20-17, Item 6</u>: Allowability of Salaries and Other Project Activities. OMB added restrictions to the flexibilities allowed in Item 1. The flexibilities provided in M-20-26 are time limited with different end dates. Item 1 was extended through September 30, 2020.
- <u>Item 2 M-20-17, Item 13</u>: Extension of Single Audit Submission and COVID-19 Emergency Acts Funds Reporting. Item 2 was extended through December 31, 2020.
